Háskólafélag Suðurlands University Centre of South Iceland

- Owned by 14 municipalites
- > 25.400 inhabitants
- Three pillars:
 - Access to education
 - Research
 - Pilot projects
- Not part of the formal education system, emphasis on working with companies, universities and institutions
- Founded in 2007, start capital from the owners



Fjölheimar

- Originally a primary school (1945-2011)
- Knowledge centre since January 2013 (1.620 m²)
- 10 classrooms, 17 offices, 3 meeting rooms, reading room, 2 canteens, reception, teachers work room
- Háskólafélagið pays rent to the municipality and sublets offices to 13 different institutions and companies
- About 30 individuals with university education working in Fjölheimar, plus students
- Fræðslunetið, the Regional Adult Education Provider, is the main user of the classrooms
- Pilot courses developed and taught by Háskólafélagið
- About 1.000 exams annually, mostly for universities

Regional Development Plans The Legal Context

- New legislation in 2015, combining a Strategic Regional Plan (Byggðaáætlun) and Plans of Actions For the Regions (Sóknaráætlanir)
- Byggðaáætlun used to be no more than a mere wish list for the future, but since 2018 it also has funding secured for some of the actions of the wish list (2018-2024)
- The first Plans of Actions for the Regions will expire at the end of this year (2015-2019) and now the Regions are working on the the next five year Plans of Actions (2020-2024)
- The eight regional plans should be made according to a common contract between government ministries and the Regional Associations of Local Authorities

Three main pillars of Regional Plan of Actions in South Iceland 2015-2019


- Employment and Innovation
- Culture
- Education and Human Resources

The Regional Plan of Actions (Sóknaráætlun Suðurlands), two strands:

- Priority projects (Áhersluverkefni):
 - They are based on the main focus of the Regional Plan of Actions
 - Everyone can send in an idea of a priority project
 - Led and followed up by consultants

- Development Fund of South Iceland (Uppbyggingarsjóður Suðurlands), a competitive fund with two distinct focus areas:
 - Innovation and employment
 - Culture and arts

Network of consultants (since 2016)



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Uppbyggingarsjóður 2018

About 88 MKR (550.000 GBP) in grants (155 in total, i.e. on average about 0,57 MKR/3.400 GBP)

253 applications for about 350 MKR (2,2 M GBP)

Grants for up to 50% of total costs, the other 50% can be applicant own working hours

Áhersluverkefni (Priority Projects)

Main emphasis 2015-2019:

- Increase cooperation between municipalities in as many issues as possible
- Holistic mapping of nature, culture and human resources in the area as well as highlighting the uniqueness of the area
- Create a positive image of the South based on quality and purity.
- Focus on environmental issues with sustainability in mind, and increase use of sustainable energy and resources
- Raise the level of education by better access to education in the area
- Diversify the economy, society, culture and education.

Priority Projects in 2018 (270.000 GBP)

- Environment (62.500 GBP)
- New international airport (34.500 GBP)
- Vocational College studies (31.250 GBP)
- Remote health services (18.750 GBP)
- Culture Pass (18.750 GBP)
- Economic statistics (15.600 GBP)
- Invest in the South (15.600 GBP)
- Educational/Vocational Fair in Westman Islands 2018 (12.500 GBP)

- Educational/Vocational Fair in Selfoss 2019 (12.500 GBP)
- Courses for entrepreneurs and innovators (12.500 GBP)
- Innovation contest in upper secondary schools (6.250 GBP)
- Award for innovation and culture (6.250 GBP)
- Youth councils (3.100 GBP)
- Skaftárhreppur municipality a vulnerable area (18.750 GBP)

How do applicants rate the services of the consultants (2018)?

- Response rate around 70%
- Around 90% felt that there should be diversity in the grant amounts depending on the nature of the project ideas
- Around 90% were happy with two application periods per year
- Around 83% of the respondents were pleased or very pleased with the services of the consultants, none were displeased and 17% did not contact the consultants
- Slightly more females in terms of number of applicants and grants
- About 72% of all grants awarded in 2018 were handled by consultants of Háskólafélag Suðurlands

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Democratic challenge

- How can we make the process of determining the focus of the next five year Plan of Actions for South Iceland more democratic?
 - Each municipality select candidates for the Samráðsvettvangur (Consultation Forum). The Forum also includes the Board of the Regional Association of Local Authorities (SASS), the consultants and the Youth Councils. Meeting held on May 23 2019
 - But first structured open public meetings (April/May)
 - The outputs now being processed
 - Will formally be approved in October at the annual meeting of SASS

- First Pilot Project of Háskólafélagið, started in 2008, 65.000 GBP
- Declining population
- Application to Global Geoparks Network 2010
- Member 2011
- Yellow card 2015
- UNESCO Global Geparks 2015
- ▶ Green card 2017
- Population growing
- Pressure increasing on natural and human resources
